This risk assessment has been written to assist you in writing your own Risk Assessment for your upcoming trip. This generic assessment covers the site risks but does not assess the specific requirements, abilities, medical or physical abilities of your group. We would encourage the group organiser to visit Hobbledown Epsom to undertake your own assessment, this can be prebooked via our Contact Centre.

- The control measures indicated are recommendations only and must be adapted / amended by group organisers.
- Please ensure adequate supervisors are appointed for the number in your group.
- Areas of the attraction's grounds do feature water; children or must be accompanied by group leader at all times during the visit.
- Supervision is required at all times and there is strictly no climbing on the barriers / fencing or trees
- At Hobbledown, there are many uneven surfaces and staircases of various widths, so care must be taken when moving around the site
- Guests must use handrails where provided and running must be discouraged when moving around the site.
- Some attractions may not be suitable for children or those of a nervous disposition.
- Group leaders are responsible for ensuring all supervising adults are competent and understand their roles. Plan and use suitable group control measures (for example, buddy systems, large group split into smaller groups each with named leaders, identification systems). Discuss the itinerary and arrangements prior to arrival / departure points.

Park is inspected daily for faecal contamination by wild animals. The walkthrough areas are arranged so that there are clearly
defined animal pens, and guest paths, in enclosures where animals will freely interact with

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	Groups met at the entrance, given welcome talk including locations of handwashing, toilets, highlighting the importance of handwashing. Prior to starting the education sessions, guests will receive a Health and Safety talk reminding them of the importance of washing their hands and the risk of zoonosis. Animals being used for experiences will be accompanied by a member of the zoo team to control the animal; a second team member will control the number of people touching animals and direct guests to the hand washing facilities, reminding them of the importance of handwashing. Guests are not allowed to eat, drink, smoke or put their fingers in their mouths during the experience. If guests are not adhering to the rules, then the experience will be cut short. Animals are not free roaming i.e they are being held by the keeper.
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					•	In the event that an animal defecates, this will be cleaned up immediately and the floor disinfected once the activity is finished. Guests are not permitted to enter pens during any sessions. Animals are not placed on to people's laps to prevent contamination of clothing. All animal enclosures/hazardous areas are locked or securely fastened, so areas that are not accessible to the general public are clearly signed and gated.
